

With its historic passage in April 2021, the Teaching Equitable Asian American Community History (TEAACH) Act amended Illinois School Code, ensuring that every public elementary and high school student in Illinois learns about the contributions of Asian Americans to the economic, cultural, social, and political development of the United States.

# Sample Scope & Sequence for Grades K-5: Integrating Asian American Experiences into Reading and Social Studies

#### What Teachers Should Know

The Asian American and Pacific Islander community is very diverse. Asian Americans trace their roots to 28 different countries and Pacific Islander Americans trace their roots to 22 different countries<sup>1</sup> within which dozens of languages are spoken. It's important not to describe Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders as a monolith and, instead, strive to be as inclusive as possible of the diverse perspectives. In this guide, the 4 regional groupings included are:

- East Asia (China, Japan, Korea, and more)
- South Asia (India, Pakistan, Bangladesh, and more)
- Southeast Asia (Vietnam, Indonesia, Philippines, and more)
- Pacific Islands (Hawaii, Tonga, Guam, and more)

### How to Use this Teaching Tool

This sample scope and sequence is intended to be a starting point. It is not a comprehensive guide to teaching Asian American history. It offers excerpts from a more extensive, grade-specific resource guide that aligns with Illinois Learning Standards. The titles below offer opportunities to build a more culturally inclusive literacy experience for elementary students. Explore the list for fiction and non-fiction books to provide students with a more comprehensive view of American history that includes Asian American and Pacific Islander (AAPI) perspectives and experiences. The books included in this updated list have been evaluated by a K-12 librarian using the **Asian Pacific American Librarians Association (APALA)** <u>Rubric to Evaluate Asian American and Pacific Islander Youth Literature</u> to ensure that stories include authentic, positive, and empowering AAPI representation. The vast majority of these books center Asian American or Pacific Islander characters and have been written or illustrated by Asian American or Pacific Islander creators. In addition, a few books were included that are set in Asia or feature non-AAPI characters because these stories add insight into AAPI identities and experiences. This list strives to highlight diverse identities, themes, and perspectives within the AAPI community, yet has room for growth over time.
